Developing Reasoning Power in Children

In this dynamic world where children face a number of challenges regularly, it is imperative that they are equipped with appropriate reasoning and logical skills to tackle different situations that life may expose them to. They do not need to be formally trained to develop reasoning power or critical thinking; however, a large part of parenting should be consciously devoted in enhancing these skills. The following tips will come handy in sharpening logical and critical thinking skills in children of various age groups.

Pose real life problems and encourage children to solve them. Discussing their ideas will enable them to begin thinking logically.

Children should be allowed to ask lots of questions, this will foster curiosity in them. If a rationale doesn't make sense to a child, he/she should be encouraged to voice their opinion. The adults around the child should always give a fair hearing to them, especially if there is a difference of opinion.

Encourage children to consider more than one solution. In order to become flexible thinkers, children need to understand that many problems yield to multiple solutions. Right from early age we need to help children to complete a given task in more than one way.

Developing clear thought process develops thinking and reasoning powers. During leisure time, parents need to encourage children to practice putting things in their own words. Being able to put relevant words to thoughts is an important part of language development, which, if developed early, expedites logical and reasoning power in children.

Lastly, avoid confining critical thinking to purely factual or academic matters. Encourage children to reason and debate about ethical, moral and public policy issues. It is a good idea to have discussions during meal time when the whole family is together, this will expose children to diverse perspectives.

ICT (Future of IT industry)

In the past few years, technology has had a dramatic impact on the workplace, and the next few years will likely see the influence of technology

accelerate. That will mean radical changes for the role of the IT department and chief information officer (CIO).

It is difficult to underestimate the pace of change, said Alastair Behenna, principle analyst serving CIOs at analyst group Forrester Research.

"Six years ago, did we think we would have a billion smart phones today? Did we think we would have a workforce rising up for IT, saying 'We want it, we want it'? Did we think Apple and Google would dominate the way they do now?" he said.

What is clear, is that the convergence of mobility, big data, the cloud, collaboration tools and the internet of things will mean sweeping changes not only for business in general, but also for the role and function of the IT department.

CIOs will need to become much more focused on innovation, and less focused on just "keeping the lights on". The internet of things will be much bigger than we ever thought.

According to network supplier Cisco, the number of intelligent objects connected to the internet exceeded the number of people on the planet five years ago. By 2020, it predicts there will be 50 billion devices connected to the internet, as smart sensors become more present.

But if anything, Cisco's predictions understate the size of the change ahead, said Newman: "I think it's an underestimate. It's going to be much bigger than that."

And it is going to change the way organizations behave. Rather than passively monitoring their customers to gain insights about their behavior, the internet of things will be much more about organizations collaborating with their customers.

Organizations will turn to technology to help them improve their customer service, said Newman, predicting that they will introduce technology that will allow them to improve their service in real time.

"What you will see is faster processing of customer service and real-time adaptive learning, so people online will have options that were not available an hour ago," he said.

Free play is more than just fun for babies and children.

It's how they learn, and how they work out who they are, how the world works and where they fit into it.

The importance of play

Playing is one of the most important things you can do with your child. The time you spend playing together gives your child lots of different ways and times to learn. Play also helps your child:

- ✓ Play is important to healthy development of the brain;
- Undirected play helps children learn how to work collaboratively, to share, to negotiate, to resolve conflicts, and learn selfadvocacy skills;
- When play is child-driven, children practice decision-making skills, move at their own pace, discover areas of interest on their own, and ultimately engage fully in the passions they wish to pursue;
- ✓ When play is controlled by adults such as in organized sports children have to follow to adult rules and concerns (like winning) and lose some of the benefits play offers them, particularly in developing creativity, leadership and group skills.



- ✓ Play offers parents a wonderful opportunity to engage fully with their children;
- ✓ Play and unscheduled time that allows for peer interactions is an important component of social-emotional learning; and
- ✓ Free, child-driven, creative play protects against the effects of pressure and stress.

ISO: Making Children Safe on Road



Children need assistance dealing with the traffic environment until at least the age of 10, as they are not equipped physically or developmentally to make the crucial decisions to keep them safe. Like learning to drive a car, children need practice and experience to walk in the traffic environment. Alongside the benefits of learning road safety, it is great chance to spend time with your family and good exercise!! Children are vulnerable road users. Anywhere where there is a potential for moving vehicles is a potentially dangerous traffic situation for children. This includes residential areas, car-parks, at traffic lights, along footpaths, pedestrian and other crossings, driveways, quiet streets, and busy streets.

When the time comes to teach your child about crossing the road, remember the following:

- ✓ Always set a good example by choosing a safe place to cross and explaining what you're doing.
- ✓ Let your child help you decide where and when it's safe to cross.
- ✓ Tell your child that it's safest to cross at a pedestrian crossing.
- ✓ Tell your child not to cross where they can't see far along the road.
- Explain that they should not try to cross a road between parked cars; drivers won't be able to see them very well and the cars might start moving.
- When it's safe to cross, walk straight across the road and keep looking and listening out for traffic.
 Remind your children to concentrate they may be easily distracted, forget what they have been taught and dash out into the road.

In an effort to sensitize the students for the protection of archeological monuments in the country a trip was planned for the students of class VII and VIII to Delhi's most beautiful monument Humayun's Tomb a testimony of Mughal architecture deftness, style and gardens and an opportunity for the students to revisit an era which is a long past gone. Anitya's Golf Tip of the Month

To play consistent golf, it is important that you are in a very stable position at the top of your backswing so that you are able to start down correctly to the ball and get proper contact with the ball.

I see a very common problem with juniors—especially with junior girls that they are not in a stable position at the top of the backswing. This is because most juniors do not have enough strength in their hands and arms and as they reach the top of the backswing, the club tends to waver out of position.

Looking at a player from the down the line view as shown in the photograph, you can see that I am helping my student Neha Tripathi, India's leading woman professional golfer, to get her club in a nice and balanced position at the top of the swing. In this position the club is approximately parallel to the target line and not pointing too far left or right of the target line.

In technical terms, we call a club that is pointing left as 'Laid Off' and a club that is pointing to the right of the target line as 'Across the Line' with both the positions being incorrect and out of balance.

My advice to junior golfers is that they should simply take their backswings in front of a mirror and stop at the top for five seconds. When you stop, you will have to be in a stable position and you will not be able to stop if you are in an unstable position.
