Space is a simple word but with depth beyond words. From the tiniest insect to a human being, every living thing needs space to grow. A little larva needs to be left alone in its cocoon and in time turns into a butterfly. A plant grows best when it's nurtured, but not touched. A tree in a restricted space

won't find its roots and will eventually wither away, but if sown in the ground it will grow to full potential. A plant left in the wilderness blossoms abundantly, displays its true colours under nature's nurture. Bring the same plant to your home, tend to it and protect it with the best of intentions, it may never grow as it would have in its natural space. Animals prosper best in their natural habitat. Any living thing kept in artificial surroundings will not display its true characteristics but will perhaps take on those of the surroundings to which it is exposed. The same rings true for our children. Too much attention, positive or negative, can hamper their natural ability to grow and think. Research shows that children who are nurtured by adults who give them space grow into more confident and responsible adults than the ones who are constantly told what to do. As Haruki Murakamai says "Adults constantly raise the bar on smart children, precisely because they're able to handle it. The children get overwhelmed by the tasks in front of them and gradually lose the sort of openness and sense of accomplishment they innately have. When they're treated like that, children start to crawl inside a shell and keep everything inside. It takes a lot of time and effort to get them to open up again. Kids' hearts are malleable, but once they gel it's hard to get them back the way they were." Give children space to question, to explore, to make mistakes and most importantly make their own choices. Give them space to be themselves, to do what they want to rather than what others want them to. Let them learn the consequences of their choices naturally. Give them direction but don't dictate their action. Isn't it the same for all of us? Each of us needs 'space' to spread our wings. We feel 'stifled' with too much attention, we sometimes even feel 'smothered with love'. All we ask for is 'Me' time. Space. Together we should help our children understand the value of space, to respect each other's space and the sense of responsibility that comes with the freedom of space. If we can do that, we will bring forth into the world a generation that is free to choose, thinks independently and makes responsible decisions. Let's together continue to provide a safe, supportive and nurturing environment to our children that leads them onto a path of self-discovery.












Getting to know each other

Too Much of Television hampers child's growth



Most kids plug into the world of television long before they enter school. The first 2 years of life are considered a critical time for brain development. TV and other electronic media can get in the way of exploring, playing, and interacting with parents and others which encourages learning and healthy physical and social development.

As kids get older, too much screen time can interfere with activities such as being physically active, reading, doing homework, playing with friends, and spending time with family.

Of course, TV in moderation can be a good thing: Preschoolers can get help learning the alphabet on public television, grade schoolers can learn about wildlife on nature shows, and parents can keep up with current events on the evening news. No doubt about it — TV can be an excellent educator and entertainer.

But despite its advantages, too much television can be detrimental:

- Children who consistently spend more than 4 hours per day watching TV are more likely to be overweight.
- Kids who view violent acts are more likely to show aggressive behavior but also fear that the world is scary and that something bad will happen to them.
- TV characters often depict risky behaviors.

That's why it's so important for you to monitor the content of TV programming and set viewing limits to ensure that your kids don't spend too much time parked in front of the TV. One of the things I, as a parent who doesn't watch television, struggle most with is allowing my children to watch television.

I have fond memories of watching TV as a kid, but, I have stronger memories of playing outside in the woods, building dirt and twig forts and running free, hosting tea parties for all of my dolls, playing school and spending hours recording stories on a cassette recorder.

Which of these memories bring back happier memories?

Not the ones about watching too much TV. Those are barely in my memory bank. But ask me about playing on my grandparent's 50-acres and I can go on and on.

Children, for lack of knowing any better, will always choose to watch TV or go to the computer unless we teach them to think outside the box.



Anitya's Golf Tip of the Month

A very common problem that I see with a lot of juniors is they make very narrow arcs in the backswing as they simply pick the club up on the way back rather than swinging it allthe way to the top. This is especially the case if a youngsteris playing with heavier clubs. This puts him into a weak position at the top, resulting in a lot of mis-hits.

Try this drill to develop a strong backswing and also a strong left arm.

Take your normal grip, set up on the ball and then put your right hand on your left forearm as shown in the picture. Now, using the support of the right hand, take the club up to the top of the backswing with the left arm being extended all the way to the top.

The left arm being straight maintains the wide radius of the backswing circle as well as gets the club into a more parallel and stable position at the top. This help in making the left arm stronger as the left arm will do the bulk of the work of getting the club to the top of the backswing and holding it in a stable position.

Another reason for this narrow arc as well as inconsistent top of the backswing position is that most right-handed juniors are right hand dominant and have developed their right hand strength far more than their left hand, making it far stronger. As a simple test, if you ask a right handed junior to pick up a weight with eitherof his two hands, the right hand will be able to pick up far more weight than the left. This also causes the right hand to dominate the back swing and put the club into an unstable position.



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
