Transdisciplinary Learning for Transcendental Growth

The young learners of Pre-Nursery under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'How we express ourselves' have emerged to be open-minded and risk-takers towards new learning. The unit encouraged the little ones to be communicators with ample opportunities to share their perspective, be it about their favourite colour or the toy that they love to play with. Setting up simulation corners in the classrooms paved the way for their exploration and discovery through which they formed new understanding. Parents as guest speakers were encouraged to come in to share about their favourite game and the rules that need to be followed while playing the same. This also proved to be an enriching experience for the little ones. It helped in bringing forth deeper understanding about the need to cooperate and adopt certain codes of behaviour while playing a particular game.



Nursery students through the unit under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'Who we are' garnered understanding of importance of families and friends in one's life and how to be responsible towards them. Going through the various visual mediums like Power Point Presentations, flashcards and picture books; and innumerable brainstorming sessions led to deeper conceptual understanding about the unit. The same was visible when the children teamed up with their peers and engaged in questioning each other to learn more about the family. The unit also encouraged the young ones

to be principled and caring while playing cooperative games. Performing a self-assessment on one's understanding of following the norms while playing; brainstorming and drafting essential agreements for the games class were other ways that the students endeavoured to be responsible towards each other.



Few sections of Kindergarten on the other hand have been busy inquiring about the ways in which an image can help in communicating an idea or an information under the Transdiscplinary Theme 'How we express ourselves'. Watching Power Point presentations, going through visual mediums like resource books, the Internet and other learning aids helped the children understand about moving and static images and differentiate between them. Oral presentation on an image of one's choice gave the students an opportunity to conduct an independent inquiry and work on their research skills. Moreover, encouraging

the students to share their findings through a medium of their preference motivated them to share their perspective and hone their presentation and communication skills. The same was also evident when they chose to design a logo for their classroom and school bags. The other few sections of Kindergarten on the other hand delved into how spaces and facilities in and around buildings could be used under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'Where we are in place and time'. Engagements like planning and redesigning the class room layout, going through brochures and the Internet to observe the design layouts of various buildings are a few examples of the engagements that helped the children to work on their spatial and organizational skills. The unit saw the children delving deeply and comparing the usage of space and facilities provided in two different types of housing society. The visit facilitated their understanding and gave an impetus to their thinking skills in terms of facilities each one would individually prefer to have, if given a choice.

Grade I enthusiastically showcased their understanding of the Transdisciplinary Theme 'Where we are in place and time', when they represented their position locally and globally on maps. Through different story weavings, they could visualize and interpret various landforms. Students conducted surveys to understand how the place has changed over time and how places are represented accordingly. Their research skills surfaced when they found places where they used maps. Students reflected and critically analyzed places they would like to explore and about their geographical features. Whereas the other sections, under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'How we



organize ourselves', explored their surroundings through a school tour; where they saw various community, helpers performing their jobs. Students replicated their understanding of various profiles while relating them to different community helpers. Their inquiry skills further enhanced when they interviewed several community helpers during a field trip to Galleria Market.



Under the Transdisciplinary Theme, 'How the world works', students of Grade II demonstrated their perception of how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of technological advances on society and the environment. Watching power point presentations on different sources and forms of energy, the children understood the transformation of energy from one form to the other. A visit to a Physics laboratory and observing experiments helped them to understand that energy can be converted and transformed into different forms. Learners also showed their commitment by taking a pledge towards saving of energy for human progress. Children

enhanced their communication and research skills when they conducted different surveys and collected the information on sustainability of energies in their neighborhood. The other sections of students understood how to discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture and values under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'How we express ourselves'. Students evaluated how celebrations and traditions reflect deeper insights about people, their communities, cultures and societies. They expanded understanding on national, personal and religious festivals as they celebrated Independence Day, Janamashtami and Raksha Bandhan. They inquired into the significance of traditions and customs in a range of festivals and analyzed a local and a global light festival and compared them using a Venn diagram. A timeline on the events that are celebrated in school enhanced their awareness on the significance of rejoicing special events and the ways in which individuals, groups and societies interact with each other.





Grade III, under the Transdisciplinary Theme, 'Who we are', understood that every individual has rights and with every right comes responsibility. They connected rights with responsibilities through various learning engagements. They surveyed people from different domains like their domestic help, siblings etc. which made them aware about the roles, rights and responsibilities that various individuals play in the harmonious functioning of a community. In depth research on rights of people in India and abroad helped them to understand the sense of citizenship and

responsibility that transcends globally. The other set of sections under the Transdisciplinary Theme, 'How we organize ourselves', acknowledged the fact that the systems of measurement have evolved over the years to make life easier and its impact of scientific and technological developments. Their research skills graduated when they inquired into how and whypeople construct systems of measurement and implications of standard systems locally as well as globally. Students visited the Physics lab and MI room to observe the function of standard units of measurement to solve problems in real-life situations. Students shared their perspective as they prioritized the usefulness of measuring tools in their everyday life. They used a range of equipment like thermometers, weighing scales, measuring tapes which helped sharpen their analytical skills.



Grade IV children, under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'How we organize ourselves', inquired into the interconnectedness of human made systems both local and global which bring communities together. They comprehended the importance of markets and how they are an integral part of our local and global community. The unit moved on with sharing of ideas among children who then created a human graph on needs and wants of people around them and focused on their role as responsible consumers. A field trip to a market helped students to gain deeper insight into how consumerism is linked to demand and supply and forms of markets. Students connected and created their own market log and used different

strategies to move further with their understanding of different markets. Through dramatics and art children enacted a street play to highlight the attributes of a responsible citizens. The other grades under the Transdisciplinary Theme 'How the world works', developed an understanding on the different forms and functions of natural materials. An insight into the theme through different videos helped them to understand the conditions that cause reversible and irreversible changes. Visit to the Chemistry lab enhanced their observation skills on chemical changes that materials undergo. While observing different materials during a Gallery Walk students understood how materials change as per their use. They also understood that the things obtained naturally can undergo transformation. The concept of transformation was demonstrated through experiments on reversible and irreversible changes.



Under the Transdisciplinary Theme, 'How we organize ourselves', learners of Grade V inquired into how various styles of leadership function, and are interconnected considering the dynamics of taking appropriate decisions. They became aware of the different styles, structures and characteristics of leaders through personal inquiries, expert's talks and Skype sessions. They comprehended how decisions at personal, national or global level enable people to connect locally and globally. Guest lectures, videos, PPTs, learning engagements and discussions further enhanced

their understanding of the study of people, communities, cultures and societies; the ways in which individuals, groups and societies interact with each other is a direct outcome of good decision making. Under the Transdisciplinary Theme, 'How the world works', the other grade group predicted a new learning experience and rediscovered many facts about how our world works. The students made a connection when they observed that most of the technology around us is inspired by nature. They could connect the role of technological advancements and how they have impacted lives making it more comfortable and efficient. They comprehended the relationships between past technological advances, its influences on the present and its implications for the future in different spheres like education, transportation, communication, health care, trade and commerce. Students realized that technology is indispensable but its benefits can be reaped in the future too if used responsibly.



What we learn becomes a part of who we are.....

The Front Desk Programme (FDP) is a perfect platform for the young Highlanders to demonstrate independence and responsibility of their own learning. Underlying the values of the PYP programme, the FDP is a collaborative experience. Right from addressing the IB Learner Profile to the display of the Transdisciplinary Units of Inquiry and the approaches to learning(ATL) skills developed through exposure to co-curricular activities, the event reflects each and every aspect of the child's holistic journey of learning. The last few weeks have had the students of Kindergarten and Grade IV busy showcasing their learning in front of the parents, enthusiastically. Children left the audience mesmerized and the parents were full of praises. The entire show was a package of confidence, enthusiasm, knowledgeable and enjoyment.

Nukkad Natak - Spreading awareness

"A right delayed is a right denied", said Martin Luther King, Jr. and the only way for justice to prevail in capitalist society is for consumers to be aware of their rights. To this end, students of Kinderact Club performed a Nukkad Natak at Galleria market - on the rights of a consumer. This initiative made a big stride in spreading awareness amongst the general public about their consumer rights.

A visit to Gabriel India factory by Grade V to observe science and technology used in their daily lives under the Transdisciplinary Theme-How the world works. It was an enriching experience for the learners as they got insight into the world of technology and were able to satisfy their curiosity. The trip was an eyeopener when they interacted with the differently abled operators on the shop floor and appreciated their sincerity and hard work making them caring and tolerant young citizens.

CHILDREN are **PRECIOUS** – **TEACH** them to be **SAFE**

A child is the most precious resource an individual can have and to plan for their safety and security is of utmost importance to us. Children often lack the skills to protect themselves. It is our responsibility to safeguard children and to teach them the skills to be safe.

Following the below mentioned safety tips will definitely help our little ones be safe:

- ✓ Guide your children about **GOOD TOUCH AND BAD TOUCH.**
- Children should be aware that if anyone bothers them, they should get away from that person, and TELL a trusted adult like parents or teacher.
- ✓ If someone tries to take them somewhere, they should quickly get away and YELL, "This person is trying to take me away!" or "This person is not my father (mother)!" or "Help me."
- $\checkmark\,$ If some unknown person offers your child a lift or ride ask them to say NO.
- Always set a PASSWORD with your children and tell them not to share it with anyone. For e.g. an adult approaches your child stating, "Your parents have met with an accident, you need to rush with me." In that case ask your child to inquire for the secret password which has been decided between you and your child. If the stranger is aware of it, only then the child may go otherwise the little one should run away.
- ✓ If children want to change their plan after school, always ask them to CHECK FIRST with their parents.
- ✓ **NEVER** let the child play in a park or in a mall play area alone.
- ✓ DO NOT let the children download games or apps from Internet and never let them play video games unless or until under strict observation.
- ✓ Make your children aware No. 100 for police, make them learn your own phone no. AWARENESS is really important.
- SPEAK to your children like a friend, they should not be hesitant at any point of time to share anything with you.
- ✓ **GUIDE** your children not to accept sweets or gifts from strangers.

It has been rightly said by someone, "We are the key to our own security." Making our children aware of the above mentioned points will certainly help them a long way in keeping themselves safe and secure.

The participants should then paste their cuttings to a piece of cardboard and create a collage; they should write their names on the back.

Activity for high school students: Have students make a list of their top 10 character traits. Then have them go back to each trait and write a potential profession that identifies with it. Have students read their most significant traits and the profession that uses it and why they might want to work in that profession.

PLAYING FROM THE FAIRWAY BUNKER

As opposed to an ordinary shot from the fairway, a fairway bunker shot requires clean and precise contact, as the surface offers no forgiveness. For this, the following steps should be followed-

• Set Up- This is key towards making good contact and not catching sand before the ball. Start by shuffling your feet into the sand, as this will provide

a stable base to swing the club. Choke down on the club slightly to compensate for this. Make sure the ball is in the middle of your stance and the swing center is slightly ahead of the ball, as his will encourage you to make contact with the ball first.

 Swing- You must stay centered in your backswing with not sway or lateral movement. The lower body should remain still and only your body and arms should be used to swing the club. In the downswing, drive

with your left side, as this will help the club to strike the ball before the sand in the bunker.
