The last couple of months saw the youngest of the lot, the little Pre-Nursery students getting used to their environment, settling in, understanding the fine nuances of being in a formal educational set up. Discussions on one's identity, listening and following the instructions given, focusing on developing their self-management skills was what that kent them engaged under the

self-management skills was what that kept them engaged under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Who we are.

The Nursery students on the other hand, began with their inquiry about stories and how they can be used to communicate meaning and be used as a medium of expression under the Transdisciplinary Theme – How we

express ourselves. A visit to the Initials' library initiated an excited discussion on one's favourite story and story character, bringing forth many perspectives. Using different ways of narrating stories and linking them to attributes of the learner profile is what the children were seen delving into in the last couple of months.





Students of Grade I enthusiastically explored the Transdisciplinary Theme – How we express ourselves. Students made their own story books, wrote letters and posted them. They sent emails to parents, learnt to share their ideas with others in numerous ways and developed the profile of being a communicator and risktaker by adapting new means of

The Kindergarten students, divided into two groups, delved into different units of inquiry simultaneously. Under the Transdisciplinary Theme – How we organize ourselves, the little inquirers of KG sections were seen exploring the Initials department to understand how it's organized. Later they took a round of the whole school and recorded their findings in their inquiry booklet. The other group, on the other hand, under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Sharing the planet, delved into natural resources with a focus on water, a natural but limited resource; its function and necessity and one's responsibility towards conserving it. The young ones were seen visiting the school R.O. Plant and the chemistry lab to see where the water comes from and observe the filtration process respectively. Performing a self-assessment to demonstrate and reflect on ways one can take corrective action towards conserving water and later collectively as a class conducting a water rally in the school premises were ways to show one's commitment towards conserving water.



communication. Students made different types of puppets and added sound effects to the puppet-show which enhanced their creative skills. Whereas the other group, under the Transdisciplinary Theme - Sharing the Planet, went for a nature walk to observe the flora and fauna within the school environment. They learnt about living things that are present all around them and developed a sense of appreciation and respect for them all. They delved deeper into the inquiry of the relationships between living things and found out the importance of living beings, the interdependence between them, and how they are dependent on each other. Through various graphic organizers, students understood their responsibility towards animals, plants and themselves. Students went to different classes for awareness rally to spread their awareness about earth and living beings and our responsibility towards them.



Grade 2 embarked on how the landforms have changed through time under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Where we are in place and time. Through classroom discussions and audio-visual aids, they understood that the earth is made up of different landforms that keep changing. A visit to the Aravalli Hills gave them an insight into different landforms followed by the reflection. Watching videos on various natural disasters and measures to be taken during such mishaps enhanced their awareness about personal safety. Parallelly the

other group, under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Sharing the Planet, exhilarated their thinking process as they collaborated and used different strategies to understand with whom they shared the planet. The visit to the botanical garden helped them observe various species of plants. Children also displayed their concern for plants by sharing various ways to take care of them. They demonstrated their sense of responsibility and the importance of working towards the survival of plants by sowing seeds and taking care of plants. Grade 3 inquired into various kinds of buildings and structures under the Transdisciplinary Theme – How the world works. Students appreciated the aesthetic and ethos behind these architectural creations and human ingenuity. Taking a drive through the city helped our young learners to observe and understand different



structures and buildings. Their perspective was brought forward when they created their own structure using knowledge of different shapes and human resourcefulness. Simultaneously another group explored their classrooms, and discovered places in the school premises as a provocation, under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Where we are in place and time. Students studied the famous explorers with emphasis on why exploration take place and the impact of exploration on land and people. Students explored the city and reflected their understanding using different strategies. Students discovered new areas and become aware that exploration lead to discovery of new places and things.

Grade 4 pondered over the Transdisciplinary Theme Sharing the Planet, and realized the importance of their rights and responsibilities. They observed, identified, described and categorized their opinions on child rights and responsibilities all over the world. Students shared their ideas and opinion on diverse issues during learning, and examined a range of problems that children face across the globe. They represented their thinking and analytical skills on the challenges, risks and opportunities children for all, and child labour which fostered their understanding. A visit to the NGO, Muskaan, made them realize the challenges, risk and opportunities present



for children world over. Students went a step ahead and arranged books for underprivileged students and created a library for their class. The other set of students, under the Transdisciplinary Theme – Where we are in place and time inquired into how communities respond to significant events. They enhanced their communication skills by sharing their perspective on their personal and family events. Working through different strategies helped them grasp the impact of these events. They understood how events can change the perspective of people. Students collected information on various local and global events and shared their viewpoint.

The learners of Grade 5 inquired into the Transdisciplinary Theme – How we express ourselves. Through a plethora of learning engagements, videos, presentations, surveys and interviews, different aspects on appearances and behaviour, peer assessments, expert talks and a visit to a fashion house, they could imbibe and understand that people dress up and express themselves differently in different situations. Students worked in pairs to design apparel, and put forth their plan of action along with a message for the buyers. The other group contemplated over the Transdisciplinary Theme – How the world works. The learners enthusiastically observed, researched and surveyed to find how technology is inspired by nature. The in-depth inquiry was primarily governed by engagements that enabled the learners to understand how technology has advanced over the years and has impacted various fields, which in turn has made life more comfortable. Creating a Science and Technology Corner in the class, students could relate to the change in technology globally. Videos, presentations, field trips to car workshops, fire station visits, guest lectures helped them to visualize futuristic technology in different spheres like education, transportation, communication, health care, hospitality, trade and commerce. The students understood that advancement in scientific knowledge and technology are inter related.

Professional Development for Teachers

Scottish High looks closely at training and professional development. In school PYP workshops were conducted for teachers on 20th and 21st June 2017. Four IB PYP Workshop leaders took workshops on 'Making PYP Happen', 'Concept Base' and 'Teachers as Researchers'. The sessions were engaging, relevant, and fruitful for teachers. They were extremely insightful, with several eureka moments peppered in, for those who were experiencing the programme for the first time. Experienced teachers came across many opportunities to hone and further develop their skills. In conclusion to the session, all the PYP teachers devised action plans that reinforced the inclusion of concepts in the three areas of curriculum: written, taught and assessed.

Art & Craft

Budding artists came up with a unique and interesting visual art work. Many children were able to understand what we are

learning?, why we are learning? And how we are learning? Along with so much of attention and curiosity.

In the Primary school, Grade I (A-D) students used their creativity & imagination to depict themselves using different elements of art. On the other hand, students of Grade I (E-H) have learnt how to make different types of puppets and later they used this skill to communicate their story through puppets to a variety of audience.

Grade II (A-D) students had learnt about the Gradation (tints & shades of a colour). They used different resources like leaves, crayons, shade cards etc. to arrange them according to the Gradation effect through which their power of observation was enhanced. Grade II (E-G) learn ED similarities & differences between the abstract, realistic, cartoon and folk art. Further students created their own art form with oil pastels.

Students of Grade III (A-D) have learned what 2D and 3D geometrical shapes are and how to convert 2D shapes in to 3D. Students are able to draw a 3 D building out of this concept. And Grade III (E-I) had done a craft work in which they created a human figure out of silver foil and observed the effect of light on an art work in different time periods.

Grade IV (A-E) have beautifully created an optical illusion art through one point perspective related to the concept Change. On the other hand, students of IV (F-I) made posters to spread awareness in the society on issues related to children. They have taken an oath to fight against any atrocities towards children.

Grade V (A-C) students had created beautiful drawings through Gradation technique and V (D-G)students had designed a beautiful dress for their model figure by using different materials.

Middle school students from class 6 to 8 had learned the skill of pencil shading as well as colour pencil techniques in their optional art activity. In Craft activity, students have learnt different adhesive techniques like paper mache (strips and pulp method) and are making 3D projects like bowls, lampshades, masks etc.

Whereas in the Summer camp, students have shown a special interest in doing each of these activities with very much enthusiasm, to name a few Bag making, 3D M-Seal work, melting art, texture work (Van Gogh Starry nights) etc.

From the Counsellor's Desk

It is that time of the year.... yet again! The anxiety levels are slowly going up, conversations with friends are being directed towards how much syllabus has been completed and our bed time is gradually moving up the clock. Exams can be a stressful time for most students however there are possible ways to stay calm and positive during this time. Below are some tips to help you power through the exams:

1. Have a study routine

- If you haven't yet made one then maybe you should now. Many students have benefitted through creating a personal study plan. Having an organized study plan helps you feel motivated, productive and in control of your time as you approach closer to your exams.
- Make a daily timetable or to do list on all that needs to be done.
 It is important that you set realistic targets and try not to cram everything in one day. Your schedule should be balanced in a way that it allows you to take enough rest and do other enjoyable activities as well.
- An ideal study strategy would be to schedule 45 minutes study time followed by a break of 5-10 minutes, before getting back again to the task.

2. Get enough sleep

- A good night's rest is critical for your mental and physical stamina.
 Sleeping well helps you stay focused, alert and goes a long way in decreasing stress levels.
- Try your best to have a consistent sleep schedule- try to sleep and rise at roughly around the same time.
- Avoid using any electronic device before going to bed as that can affectyourqualityofsleep.Ideally,youshouldspend20minutesbefore goingtobeddoingsomethingrelaxingsuchasreadingalightnovelor listening to soothing music.

3. Eat healthy

- Providing your body with the correct nourishment is necessary to preserve a good energy level.
- It is important that you maintain a well balanced diet that includes plenty of fruits and vegetables.
- Further, do not forget to drink lots of water to stay hydrated. Always keep a water bottle next to you while studying.

4. Exercise

 Exercising is a great way to help you clear your head and stay refreshed. It releases feel good chemicals that work as a great stress buster!

- Try making it a point to get some fresh air every day for 20-30 minutes.
- You can use the time to take a walk, go for a jog, play a sport or even dance!

5. Positive thinking is the key

- To stay motivated, it is important that you think positive. Regularly practicing self affirmations such as 'I am doing my best', 'I am feeling calm' and 'I can do this' whenever you feel distracted or anxious can help.
- You can decide your set of self affirmations and practice saying them to yourself before you sleep at night or as soon as you wake up in the morning or when you are just about to start writing your exam.
- Alternatively, you can maintain a diary in which you write daily self affirmations to yourself.

6. Break free from distractions

- If you find yourself frequently getting distracted with your phone, computer or any other gadget, then it is essential that you practice self control.
- When you add up the total time spent on your devices, you realize how it amounts to a significant waste of time.
- It can be hard to detach from your life outside of studying but keeping the end goal and timeframe in mind will ease the process. Therefore it is important that you find a way to set a limit on the time spent on your devices.

7. Stay connected with your family or a close friend

- Sometimes you just need to talk to someone to help put you in a better mood and energize you.
- Regularly speak to a family member or close friend who can help empower you to rise above the exam stress.

8. Don't forget to breathe

- Lastly, however most importantly practice mindful breathing.
- While studying or during moments of high stress, take a few minutes to practice this. Gently close your eyes and breathe in to a mental count of 4, hold your breath for a count of 7 and then breathe out to a count of 8.
- Do this cycle several times and you should find yourself a little less stressed than before.

Anitya's Golf Tip of the Month

Position the Right Elbow Correctly in the Backswing

The best ball strikers keep their right elbow in a correct position. The right arm needs to be in a tucked in, stable position which stays in front



of the chest. From here, the right arm can come in front of the body, leading to a good delivery position, such that the upper body does not hang back and the player does not have to rely on his hands to square up the clubface.



In the ideal sequence-

- 1. The shoulders have turned completely in the backswing and the chest aims away from the target.
- 2. The wrists are fully corked and the hands fall to the right of the head.
- 3. The right elbow lies in front of the chest and points away from the target.

This will help to get the club quicker to the ball.

The best players use several drills to practice staying connected with the arms and body such as keeping a towel under the trial arm.

Practicing on working to get the club and the body in the correct position will improve consistency of the swing.
