


P and NP problems

Ever encountered a Math problem so hard that it seemed like the solution did not exist, but only to see the answer at the back of the book to be amazed that yes, the question was indeed solvable? If you did, then you have a faint idea of what NP problems are. These are problems that easily checkable – that is you can verify if the answer is correct, or not, within seconds – but these questions take loads of time to solve.

The Clay Mathematics Institute, an institute near Boston, USA, aims at expanding Mathematical knowledge and is known for giving out various Mathematical sponsorships and awards. This institute, in the year 2000, released seven mathematical problems. These problems are seven of the toughest problems which can have huge implication in real-life. If a Mathematician solves any of these seven problems, they will get a reward of a million dollars!

P and NP problem is one of these 7 problems, specifically proving or disproving that P=NP. This equation asks the question - can NP problems, with easily verifiable answers, be solved as quickly as P problems? So far, no one knows the answer!

P problem, or Polynomial time problem, are the ones that take polynomial time to solve. In other words, the longer the question gets, it doesn't become increasingly harder to solve those questions. P problems can be both checked and solved quickly. An equation like this: x-1=0, can easily give us that x=1, and you can verify the answer as well (1-1=0). Longer equations can also be solved quickly by simplifying and then solving for x. Meanwhile, NP (Nondeterministic Polynomial time) problems are more like this: if you had to go from point A to point B on the map below, with ten roads across and ten roads down which is the fastest route between the two points?



The answer to this question has not been solved, but the number of possible routes from A to B are 10! + 10!. This means that there are 7,257,600 ways of getting from point A to point B! If you need the fastest way, you will have to calculate the time taken for each of the 7 and a quarter million routes and see which is fastest. A more Mathematical description for what defines P and NP problems is this: problems that take time proportion

to x (the size of the problem) to solve are P problems. For example, you need to find the largest number in a list of size 'x.' You will see each number in the list, check if it is the largest one in the list so far, and at the end of the list you know the largest number in the list. So, the time taken to solve this problem is proportional to x. Other P problems are proportional to x2 or x3. NP problems, however, take time proportional to a number raised to the xth power: 2x or 3x.

For any problem where x is ten, P problems take just 10sec, or 100sec (1min 40sec) when proportional to x2, but for NP problems when x is 10, time taken is to solve 1024sec, or 59049sec (16h 24min and 15sec).

This huge gap is why proving P=NP is particularly important because most real-life scheduling problem are NP problems. A well-known problem is the Travelling- Salesman one. This is about having pre-set destinations a salesperson/mail carrier must visit and a condition of a maximum distance that can be travelled by the salesperson is also present. So, which is the best way to reach all destinations in the least time while making sure that



maximum distance is not exceeded? Eventually the answer will come, albeit in a very inefficient and time-consuming way, which leads us back to P=NP. Is there a better way to solve these NP problems?

Why no one has yet proven or disproven P=NP is because all NP problems are based on fundamentally the same thing. If you can find an easier way solve one NP problem, then you can quickly solve all other NP problems. Since proving or disapproving P=NP involves trying to solve a NP problem, it indirectly makes proving P=NP a NP problem.

The ICSE/ISC Convener Meeting for the 2022–2023 academic year was held at Shikshantar School to discuss the student and examiner statistics for the 2023 Exam. The same was attended by Ms. Barkha Anand and Ms. Bhawna Rajput.

The half-yearly exams for Grades IX-X ICSE and XI-XII ISC were conducted in the month of September 2022. The ICSE and ISC question papers were created using the changed paper pattern for the 2023 Examination. MCQs, short answer questions, and long answer questions were all included in the papers. The corrected answer sheets of the same were given back to the students. On September 24, PTM was held. During this time, the students' success in the half-yearly exam was addressed, and parents received an overall evaluation of their ward's performance as well as suggestions for improvement. Highlander Green Crusaders Seek Protection for Aravallis: Save Aravallis Campaign

Highlander Green Warriors have joined hands with the student representatives of many schools in Delhi and the NCR region and visited the Prime Minister's Office, Environment Minister's Office, Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, and Haryana and Rajasthan Chief Ministers' Offices on the 13th and 14 September 2022 to give their petition to support the 'Aravalli

Bachao Campaign' for the threat that 'NCR Draft Regional Plan 2041' poses to the entire ecosystem and the quality of life of everyone living in the NCR area. Earlier, the entire Scottish High Community signed a petition to remove the environmental dilutions from the NCR Draft Plan 2041. In their petition, the Green Warriors highlighted that the implementation of the new NCR Draft Regional Plan 2041 will threaten the quality of life of millions of people living in the 25 districts of the 4 NCR states as this draft plan excludes the terms 'Aravallis', 'Forest Areas', 'Natural Conservation Zone'. It has also removed tributaries, floodplains of rivers, and waterbodies not created by acts of nature and other natural areas not recognized in revenue records or notified under central or state acts, etc. They handed over this petition which was signed by more than 12000 students and 900 teachers and requested the authorities asking them to remove the environment and ecosystem-related dilutions in the NCR Draft Regional Plan 2041. If this draft plan is implemented the way it is, it will take away protection for most of our natural ecosystems and will open them for commercialization in 25 districts across the 4 NCR states of Delhi, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan. While talking to the Highlanders, the Hounarable Minister of Housing and Urban Affairs Mr. Hardeep Singh Puri, ensured that he will consider their request and suggestions given by the environmentalists and will invite the students for a workshop to strengthen the environmental and ecological aspects of Aravallis. The students also met a senior official in the Haryana Bhavan and the Chief Resident Commissioner at the Rajasthan Bhawan. All these meetings gave excellent exposure to the students on how to talk with senior government officials and a real-life experience of being active citizens. Mrs. Shubhra Singh, the Chief Resident Commissioner at Rajasthan Bhawan was very pleased with the passion of the children for Aravalli protection. Mrs. Singh assured the students that she would convey their concerns to the Chief Minister of Rajasthan. On 14th September 2022, when Highlanders were at the Ministry of Environment with the delegates of other schools, NDTV invited the Aravalli Bachao team with a few students to participate in a live discussion in their studio in Greater Kailash. 5 schools including Scottish High got a chance to go to the NDTV studio. Our student representatives spoke to the NDTV anchor Divya Wadhwa

about their concern to save the Aravallis. Highlanders are planning to give their petition to the Chief Ministers of UP and Delhi as well as to the top bureaucrats to register objections to this draft plan and give suggestions to them to increase the forest cover of Aravallis.

Counselling Department at Scottish High International School, Gurugram organised a plethora of events for students, parents and teachers.

Session with Parents

The University Application Process workshop was taken by a School Counsellor, Ms. Neha Singh Maurya, for the parents of our Grade XII ISC and IBDP students. Important national and international university deadlines were discussed with them. Parents were informed that a few applications, such as CLAT, UCAS, and Common App, had already begun. Major entrance tests were mentioned to them, along with the dates on which they will be held.

Parents were enlightened about the documentation and school support system. They were made to understand the components incorporated in preparing the transcripts. Process for the generation of predicted Grades and for requesting the letters of recommendations were discussed.

Session with Students

Counsellor's talks were also organised for Grades VII and VIII. Possible downsides of Social Media were discussed in these counsellor's sessions wherein four major downsides were focused upon - distractions, social comparisons, doom scrolling and cyber security. Learners could relate with the topic as it is directly impacting their lives. Today's youth is deeply indulged in social media, thus the discussion on this topic was indispensable.

Orientation sessions on camps were also conducted for the learners of Grades VI to VIII. Important points regarding the behavioral expectations on the camps, safety and security measures were discussed. Learners felt even more equipped to go on camps after these sessions and their excitement was palpable.

The University Career Fair was organized on the school campus for students and parents of Grade IX to XII. The fair began with an enlightening address by Mr. Swaraj Nandan who is the co-founder of KIC UnivAssist. The fair provided an opportunity for our students and parents to connect with university delegations in person. Representatives from 19 US universities and one university from Hong Kong participated in the event. The delegates interacted with our students on a one-on-one basis. The event proved to be a wonderful experience for both parents and students.

Session with Teachers

A Third-World Take



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

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

Sliding Through Impact



Last month, we discussed how various players swing with various different swings but their impact position is very much the same. They have their weight on the left side and the club connects with the golf balls first before it strikes the ground

One of the common mistakes we see in junior golfers is sliding through impact. This happens when a golfer starts

the down swing too quickly with the hips and lower body thrusting towards the target rather than shifting on to the left leg and then turning out of the way. This can be seen in the picture where my hips have gone too far towards the target and the hands and club are lagging way behind. Sliding is commonly seen in junior golfers as they do not have the strength and stability in their lower bodies to be able to decelerate by the time the club reaches impact. When a player slides, it si also very difficult for them to maintain their balance till finish position

A very good drill to help reduce sliding through impact is to ensure that your right foot is flat on the ground at impact. This will help in reducing the amount the legs and hips thrusting through impact and stabilize the lower body
