BRING THE NATURE IN

Ways to Improve Indoor Air Quality and Reduce Air Pollution in Your Home Naturally.

Plants are nature's natural air filters. Buying a few indoor plants can do wonders to improve the indoor air quality in your home while enhancing your home décor. They not only add some colour to the room, but they also act as natural air purifiers. Depending on your space, there are plants that thrive in sunlight and those that need little light and hardly any maintenance. Add a spider plant or a terrarium to brighten your space and help clear the air. Small plants like ferns and lilies (which bloom indoors) and larger palm trees are the best options to pull contaminants out of the air.

Here are 10 plants that can clean up the air indoors for you:

1. Aloe Vera (Aloe barbadensis)

Aloe Vera is a succulent, perennial plant that has the ability to filter benzene and formaldehyde.

There are about 250 varieties you can choose from. It is easy to grow and requires a lot of sunlight.

2. Spider Plant (Chlorohytum comosum)

NASA has named the Spider Plant is one of the best indoor plants to remove formaldehyde from indoor air. It also battles benzene, carbon monoxide, and xylene. You can neglect this plant all you want, but its resilience keeps it alive.

3. Snake Plants (Sansevieria trifasciata 'Laurentii')

Also known as mother-in-law's tongue, this plant is one of the best at filtering out formaldehyde. It also helps in eliminating nitrogen dioxide. Even at night, it takes in carbon dioxide and releases oxygen. This makes for a good bedroom plant. It requires minimal sunlight and water and is not very difficult to maintain.



4. Areca palm (Chrysalidocarpus lutescens)

This plant is a natural humidifier which can be beneficial in areas with dry air. It helps eliminate carbon monoxide, xylene, benzene and formaldehyde. Areca palms filter out harsh chemicals including acetone, xylene and toluene, which accumulate from products such as nail varnish, detergents, wooden furniture, poor ventilation, gasoline, cosmetics, etc.

5. Golden Pothos (Scindapsus aures)

This fast-growing vine is great at battling formaldehyde. It grows in any type of light with an exception to sunlight and is very easy to maintain. However, it is toxic if consumed. So, if you have kids running around indoors, this one is not for you.

6. Chrysanthemum (Chrysantheium morifolium)

The colourful, bright flowers do a lot more than brighten up the place. It is a seasonal flower, and for the six weeks that it does bloom, it is great at combating benzene. It needs a lot of sunlight to bloom; you can place it at a place where it receives direct sunlight.

7. Red-edged dracaena (Dracaena marginata)

The red-edged leaves of this plant remove xylene, trichloroethylene and formaldehyde. It is slow-growing and add colour to the environment. However, it is poisonous if consumed by pets.

8. Gerber Daisies (Gerbera jamesonii)

Gerber Daisies have bright and colourful flowers. Not only do they look beautiful, they are great at absorbing carbon monoxide and benzene. This plant gives off oxygen at night; it is ideal for bedrooms.

9. Weeping fig (Ficus benjamina)

This plant is useful in fighting benzene, formaldehyde and trichloroethylene. It is a little difficult to maintain this one. It needs a lot of attention vis-à-vis water and sunlight.

10. Warneck dracaena (Dracaena Deremensis 'Warneckii')

This plant can reach a height of about 10 feet. It makes for a rather striking houseplant. It helps eliminate VOCs, benzene, formaldehyde and trichloroethylene. It doesn't need too much light to grow and thrives in room temperature.

Other than nurturing indoor plants you can further improve your home's indoor air quality naturally by following these simple tips

Check Your Furniture

Some of your furniture may be made with toxic glues that can contain harmful chemicals. In addition, finishing products such as lacquers and varnishes may cause problems for some people with allergies and asthma. Avoid furniture made with woods that have been treated with formaldehyde and put together with toxic glues.

Reconsider Your Paint

Some paints in the market that may cause you to feel faint or dizzy due to the fumes. Look for paints that are labeled "Zero VOC" or "Low VOC" to cut down on harmful chemicals.

No Smoking

Don't allow guests to smoke in your home. Secondhand smoke not only causes odors but also increases the chance of developing asthma and cancer, among other health risks.

Go Fragrance Free

Fragrances found in many cleaning products can impact those with asthma and allergies. Look for fragrance-free products, including laundry soap and kitchen and bathroom cleaners. Try using natural cleaners such as lemon and baking soda to make your home sparkle.

Cut Out Aerosol Sprays

Aerosol sprays can release harmful chemicals into the air. Instead, opt for non-aerosol versions of hair sprays, deodorants, furniture polishes and air fresheners

Tackle Mold and Mildew

Mold and mildew can lead to air quality problems, especially for those with breathing issues. Reduce the chance of mold by fixing any leaking plumbing and emptying the drip tray of your window air conditioner.

Try Beeswax Candles

Candles help a space feel cozy, but many candles contain paraffin which is made from petroleum and can impact your home's air quality. Instead, try beeswax candles which emit almost no smoke so they are great options for those with allergies and asthma.

Control Humidity In Your Home

Add Humidity, But Not Too Much. Keep your home's humidity at the right level, around 30 to 50 percent. This will help keep indoor allergens under control.

Take Off Your Shoes and Boots

Who knows what's on the bottom of your shoes, so be sure everyone removes shoes when coming at home.

Keep Floors Rugs And Carpets Clean

Allergens can accumulate on your floors, especially if you have rugs or carpeting. Use a vacuum with a HEPA filter to reduce harmful pollutants and regularly mop hardwood, tile and vinyl floors.

Change Your AC Filter And Other Air Filters And Use Cooking Vents And Chimneys.

Natural ventilation can also improve indoor air quality by reducing pollutants that are indoors. Examples of natural ventilation are opening windows and doors. window shading such as closing the blinds. Turn on exhaust fans and use cooking vents and chimneys while cooking.

Counselling Department at Scottish High International School, Gurugram organised a number of events for the students in the month of November, 2022.

Counselling sessions were organised separately for the boys and girls of Grade IX on the possible downsides of social

Counselling Department at Scottish High International School, Gurugram organised a plethora of events for the students in the month of December, 2022.

Counselling sessions were organised with the students from Middle School to address exam related stress, time management, and other adolescence related challenges. Various sessions were organised for the students of Grade VI addressing time management challenges and general exam related worries. Ms. Stuti Sood, Counselling Psychologist, conducted a session on the pertinent issue of 'body image'. She shared her experience of the ways networking helped her in advancing her career. Mr. Abhishek Gupta shared the skill set one requires to gain leadership positions later in one's career and are required in enhancing leadership skills. He shared the role of communication, networking, internship and gaining experiences in sharpening one's leadership skills.

These sessions have proved to be extremely beneficial for not just the students, but also for the faculty members as they share the insight into the thinking patterns of the students. This way, these sessions empower students to strengthen their skillsets and empower the teachers to be better prepared to address the needs of the students.

This boy is about speaking, and laughing and writing,








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Golf

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

This month, let's have a look at a very common problem that happens with junior golfers when they are chipping

Once you have taken a good set up for a chip shot, use your arms and shoulders to swing the club back and through making a pendulum sort of an action that can produce consistent contact and control over the distance of the shot. A fault that is commonly seen in junior golfers is when they use too much of wrist action in the backswing and this causes the club face to open up when the club goes back. You can see this in the picture and



notice how my wrists have opened up the club face with the face pointing up to the sky rather than towards the ground. This will need a player to compensate when they come back to the ball else the ball will go off to the right side and have less distance

Using the arms rather than the wrists is the correct way to swing the club back in chipping and ensures that your contact with the ball is crisp and you have good control over the shot.
