Mental Health-Why it Matters

A lot is being spoken about mental health of adults and children these days. After Covid 19, the world has changed and so have the requirements of emotional and mental health needs. If we want to raise confident and self-assured kids we need to generate talks on mental health with children at all age levels. Mental health is the way children think and feel about themselves and the world around them. It affects how children cope with life's challenges and pressures. Good mental health is an important part of healthy child development, it helps to build positive social, emotional, thinking and communication skills. It also lays a sound foundation for better mental health and wellbeing later in life.

Our kids experience all sorts of emotions as a part of growing uphappiness, fear, disappointment, sadness, anger, joy and so on. When children learn to cope with situations sensibly they are likely to feel good about themselves. Here are some ways we can help children learn to manage their emotions and become ready to face the real world. We can start by encouraging the children recognise and define their emotions, we need them to understand that it is natural to have all sorts of feelings. They need to understand that adults around them too experience similar feelings and if the adults model a positive behaviour in front of children it enables them to observe live examples. It sends positive vibes to children that their parents and guardians practice what they preach. Kids are wonderful observes, they watch and learn, therefore, parents can teach several lessons by their day to day behaviour. For being role models we adults have to be very mindful of reacting to situations in front of children, keeping calm and showing control during uncomfortable situations, can go a long way in teaching mood regulations to kids. We need to ensure that we have realistic expectations from our kids because mental health of our children is more important than our high expectations. It is important that they enjoy their childhood being creative, happy and playful. As rightly expressed by an expert, responding to children with love in their worst moments, their selfish moments, their lonely moments, their frustrated moments, their inconvenient moments, is the best strategy, because it is in their most unlovable human moments that they most need to be loved.

Therefore, let us remember to be kind to children, as kindness is always the right response. When children have problem, stop, listen, and then respond to the behaviour. The behaviour can be addressed later, after the need has been met, because only then is the door to effective communication truly open.

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

How to hit the Driver

The driver offers us a scenario where we find the ball teed up in the air about 2-3 inches and not lying on the grass. The following are the adjustments that need to be made in order to hit the driver well:

Posture and set up: in a regular iron shot we keep our shoulders parallel to the ground and target. However, for a driver, feel like your shoulder is aiming up, that is, make sure your trail shoulder is slightly lower than your leading shoulder. This setup helps in hitting the ball on the up. Another thing to focus on is the stance. Since the driver is a longer club, we need more stability which can be ensured with a wider stance. A narrow stance would make you hit down on the ball whereas a wider stance helps in hitting up on the ball.

Ball position: as the club increases, the ball keeps moving forward in the stance.



For a driver, the ball should be on the inside of the left heel (for right-handed) or inside the right heel (for left-handed). Such a ball position would make sure you don't contact down on the ball.

Impact position: it is important to remember that at impact try to feel that your body is behind the ball, rather than being on the ball.

Having a good set up is the first step towards becoming a good driver of the golf ball. Follow the above steps and you will be well on your way.
