
"The greatness of a culture can be found in its festivals."

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

Bunker Shot Basics

Having set up correctly in the bunker, lets have a look at two important aspects in order to take the ball out of the sand

Firstly, in a bunker shot, there is no direct contact of the club head with the sand. The club head goes into the sand under the ball and the sand is thrown out with the speed of the swing along with the golf ball sitting on top of this sand.

You can see in the set up picture that there is a line drawn in the sand approximately two inches behind the golf ball. This is the place where I want the club to enter the sand and thereafter go under the ball. If the club hits the ball directly, the ball will simply go too far and end up over the green. If it hits too far behind this line, there may not be enough enery given to the ball for it to come out of the bunker. Hence hitting the sand at the line is hugely important

In the second picture, you can see that I have taken a three quarter backswing and am ready to swing the club head under and through the ball. This allows me to accelerate ghe club head through impact thereby giving enough energy to the golf ball to come out

A combination of a good set up along with ensuring that the club head strikes the sand at the correct location will go a along way in helping you get the ball out of the sand
