anuary means beginning of New Year, new aspirations, new hopes, new resolutions and new commitments. This month reminds about the people who genuinely contributed for the mankind and all the festivals falling this month are meant for everyone's prosperity. It was the commitment of Louis Braille who was born on January 4th and invented the Braille script for blinds. Thus this day is marked as World Braille Day. To raise the awareness of the value of birds in our ecosystem January 5th is celebrated as National Bird Day. Tenth Guru of Sikhs Guru Gobind Singh ji was born in 1666. This year his birth anniversary was celebrated on January 6th. Hindi is the third widely spoken language in the world. One of the most prominent freedom fighter Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose was born on 23rd January, 1897 in Cuttack. He was the founder of the Indian National Army. We celebrate his anniversary on this day and recall his slogan 'Jai Hind'. Along with him we also recall the contribution of Punjab Kesari, Lala Lajpat Rai who was born on January 28th, 1865 in Punjab. Moreover, Indian Constitution came into effect on January 26, 1950 and India became a democratic republic. Thus, we celebrate this day as a National Festival, 'Republic day' with a massive parade in New Delhi every year.

In a nutshell, the month of January reminds us of the spirit of "service before self," a core aspect of Indian culture and tradition that holds even greater significance in today's global context. With this reference, Swami Vivekanada rightly quoted this Sanskrit phrase in one of his speeches: " सन्निमत्ते वरं त्यागो विनाशे नियते सिति।" "When death is certain, it is best to dedicate oneself for a good cause."

Developing Higher Order Thinking

"Education is not the learning of facts, but training of the mind to think." - Albert Einstein

One of the core goals of the IB is to foster deep understanding and critical thinking among students. Bloom's Taxonomy directly supports this goal by providing a clear pathway from simple recall of information (Remember) to complex tasks such as creating new ideas (Create). At the beginning of the learning process, students are asked to recall factual information or explain concepts (Remember and Understand), which forms the foundation for deeper cognitive engagement. As students' progress through the levels, they are encouraged to apply their knowledge in various contexts (Apply), analyze relationships between concepts (Analyze), evaluate different perspectives (Evaluate), and ultimately synthesize new ideas (Create). This hierarchy mirrors the IB's focus on building intellectual independence and preparing students for real-world problem-solving.

At Scottish High we encourage inquiry-based learning, where students actively engage with content, ask questions, and seek to make connections across disciplines. Bloom's Taxonomy supports this approach by providing a framework for structuring

questions and tasks that challenge students to move beyond rote memorization. For example, in the – Analyze phase, students are tasked with comparing and contrasting different ideas or theories, promoting an active inquiry into how knowledge is interconnected. Similarly, at the – Evaluate and Create levels, students are encouraged to critique theories or produce original works that demonstrate their understanding and ability to innovate. These higher-order thinking skills align with the IB's emphasis on student-driven learning, fostering a deeper engagement with the material. Bloom's Taxonomy aids in the development of well-rounded, intellectually curious students, qualities that are central to the IB Learner Profile. Through tasks that require higher-order thinking, students are encouraged to think critically, reflectively, and creatively. These cognitive skills extend beyond the classroom, helping students become active global citizens, capable of engaging with complex issues and contributing meaningfully to society. As students' progress through the levels of Bloom's Taxonomy, they are equipped not only with academic knowledge but with the cognitive and intellectual tools necessary to think independently and solve problems in innovative ways.



Exams can be a daunting experience, but with the right mindset and preparation, you can achieve success. Here are some valuable exam tips to help you prepare and perform your best:

Pre-Exam Preparation

Develop a study schedule that covers all the material you need to review. Break down your study sessions into manageable chunks, and set realistic goals. Keep all your study materials, including notes and practice exams, organized and easily accessible. Don't hesitate to ask for help if you're struggling with a particular concept or subject. Regular review and practice help solidify information in your long-term memory. Use flashcards, practice quizzes, and past exams to reinforce your learning.



Exam Day Strategies

Plan to arrive at least 30 minutes before the exam. Bring all necessary materials, including your ID, calculator, and any other required items. Take deep breaths, and try to relax. Allocate your time wisely, and make sure you leave enough time to answer all questions. Start with the questions you're most confident about, and then move on to the more challenging ones. If you're unsure of an answer, try to eliminate any obviously incorrect options.

After the Exam

Treat yourself to something nice, and take time to relax and recharge. Reflect on your exam experience, and identify areas for improvement. Regardless of the outcome, maintain a positive attitude, and focus on what you can learn from the experience.

Remember to stay focused, calm, and positive, and you'll be on your way to acing your exams!


At Scottish High International School, we focus on helping students grow in all areas of their lives. Our counseling department works to create a supportive environment that helps students do well in school, grow personally, and feel

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

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

Junior golfers often swing the club too far with their club over swinging in the backswing. It is not unusual to see the hands of a junior golfer over the head or even past the head at the top of the backswing when viewing the swing on video. From such a long backswing, it becomes very difficult for them to recover the club and strike the ball efficiently

We are looking for a tucked in, stable position of the right arm, which stays in front of the chest at the top of the



backswing. This will enable a consistent and powerful strike to the golf ball with the player not having to let his upper body hang back to let his hands square the club face.

In the ideal top of the backswing position, we are looking for the following three things:

- → The shoulders are turned fully and the chest is aiming away from the target
- → The wrists are fully cocked and the hands are to the right side of the head (for a right handed golfer)
- → The right elbow is in front of the chest and points away from the target rather than to a point behind your body

Getting the hands shorter and to the right side of the head helps you to get the club to the ball quicker in the downswing as the club and the arms stay in front of your body.

Work on getting your body and the club to the correct position at the top of the backswing and your swing consistency will surely improve.
