we can significantly reduce such errors and foster clearer, more meaningful interactions.

Good listening skills demonstrate a person's ability to effectively receive and interpret information during communication. This naturally leads to better understanding, helps build stronger rapport with the speaker, and benefits us both personally and professionally.

For anyone—especially students—who wish to develop trust, improve learning outcomes, and make better decisions, active listening is one of the most important keys to success.

## Significance of Saying 'No' to Children

In today's fast-paced, comfort-driven world, saying 'No' to children has almost become a lost art. Parents and teachers, driven by love and the desire to protect, often find it hard to deny children what they want. Whether it's the latest gadget, extra screen time, or skipping responsibilities, many of us hesitate to set boundaries, fearing they might hurt a child's feelings or dampen their confidence. But what we often forget is that a well-timed, gentle 'No' can be one of the most powerful tools in shaping responsible, resilient individuals.

Our children today are growing up in an age of instant gratification, everything, from food to entertainment is just a click away. In such a world, constantly hearing-Yes can make it difficult for them to understand patience, self-control, and the value of effort. Saying 'No' teaches them that not everything comes easily and that some things must be earned. This lesson, though simple, becomes the foundation for emotional maturity and real-world success.

A negative response also helps children to learn to deal with disappointment, an essential life skill. Shielding them from every failure or frustration may seem kind in the short term, but it robs them of the ability to cope when life doesn't go their way. When children are allowed to experience small disappointments early on, they learn to handle larger challenges later with strength and grace. It's like emotional musclebuilding, uncomfortable at first, but vital for growth.

Basically, boundaries set through saying 'No' instil discipline. When parents or teachers do not surrender to unreasonable demands, it teaches children to respect rules and limits. It also helps them understand the importance of balance between work and play, wants and needs, freedom and responsibility. Without these limits, children may struggle to manage time, money, or emotions as they grow older. Of course, the way we say 'No' matters just as much as the 'No' itself. It should come from a place of care, not control, explaining why a certain behaviour or request isn't acceptable helps children understand that no doesn't mean rejection, it means guidance. For example, saying, "No, you can't have more screen time because your eyes need rest," communicates concern, not authority. Over time, children begin to internalize this reasoning and start making thoughtful choices on their own.

Lastly, saying 'No' isn't about being strict or unkind. It's about helping children develop strength, empathy, and self-awareness, qualities that a constant 'Yes' can never provide. The art of saying 'No' is really the art of teaching balance, between desire and discipline, between freedom and responsibility. So, the next time a child insists on something unnecessary or harmful, remember - saying 'No' isn't depriving them — it's preparing them. After all, the strongest foundations are built not on indulgence, but on understanding, patience, and love.

## Wellbeing at Scottish High: More Than Just a Subject

When Cambridge Assessment International Education introduced Wellbeing as a core subject, it wasn't simply to add another class to the timetable—it was a response to a growing reality. More students today face emotional challenges, anxiety, and stress than ever before. Research highlights that young people aged 11–14 experience significant shifts in their thinking and emotions, often struggling to navigate these changes.

Students who feel emotionally balanced tend to thrive. They focus better, recover from setbacks more easily, and engage more deeply in learning. Recognizing this, Cambridge developed a curriculum built around three key areas: Understanding Myself, My Relationships, and Navigating My World.

At Scottish High, we have embraced this framework through hands-on, meaningful activities that resonate with students' daily experiences. For example, students created Body Maps to identify where stress manifests physically—many linked their headaches to test anxiety for the first time. We now practice breathing exercises before tests and encourage positive self-talk when facing challenges.

During September and October, our focus was on building healthy friendships. Through role plays, students explored both supportive and unsupportive interactions, gaining a clearer understanding of what makes relationships strong. In our Pride Gallery activity, they celebrated achievements beyond academics—like helping a sibling or standing up for a friend.

The feedback has been heartening. One parent shared, "My daughter now tells me when she's anxious instead of keeping it to herself." A student said, "I do the breathing thing before tests, and it actually helps."

Looking ahead, next term we'll focus on conflict resolution and perspective-taking—skills students can apply immediately in their daily lives. Our goal isn't to eliminate problems but to equip students with the confidence and tools to manage them—one class at a time.

### When Vision Out speeds Execution: Jaguar's Strategic Stumble

Jaguar has long aspired to reinvent itself with a future-facing vision, positioning the brand as a bold, all-electric luxury marque with a refreshed identity. But in recent months, the company's strategy appears to be lagging behind its ambition, reminding us of the fragile gap between vision and execution. One of the most conspicuous tensions lies in

Jaguar's pivot to an all-electric lineup and the rollout of a radical rebranding campaign, dubbed Reimagine. The new branding leans heavily into abstract imagery and ethosdriven messaging, sometimes at the expense of showcasing the cars themselves. Critics argue this shift has alienated traditional enthusiasts who cherished Jaguar's heritage. Meanwhile, the commercial results are raising eyebrows. Jaguar's sales volumes have plunged, partly due to the planned phase-out of legacy internal combustion models ahead of new electric ones, and partly due to supply chain disruptions. The recent cyberattack that forced Jaguar Land Rover to suspend production further compounded these difficulties. Another strain has emerged from vehicle reliability concerns. Reports suggest that electronic system failures (in components like ECUs, sensors, and detection modules) account for a disproportionately high rate of issues in Jaguar and Land Rover models. When a premium brand's products struggle with durability, brand reputation can erode fast. In sum, Jaguar's strategy may not be inherently flawed, its ambition to leap into electric luxury and to redefine its identity is bold and forward-looking. But the execution has exposed critical gaps: messaging that distances loyal customers, product delays, technical reliability issues, and operational shocks like cyber risk. The lesson is familiar but sobering: in transformation, how you change matters as much as that you change.

Our recent sessions have provided students with valuable learning experiences, while our counselors were provided with a platform to undergo professional growth by participating in a comprehensive training program organized by the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development.

An insightful workshop was held for the students of Grade VIII and IX at Scottish High International School by Pratisandhi Foundation, a non-profit organization committed to de-stigmatizing sexuality education. The session, led by Dr. Kaavya Sreedhar, Ms. Anisha Hallan, Ms. Suhani Goel and Ms. Sanah Srivastava, aimed to educate and empower students on vital subjects of sexual health and well-being.

For Grade VIII, the focus was on "Understanding Menstruation and Reproductive Health," where students were educated on topics such as anatomy, menstrual cycle and hygiene, pregnancy and sexual reproductive health. For Grade IX, the session covered "Understanding Consent, Values, and the Impact of Pornography," addressing topics like consent, online safety, and the side effects of masturbation and pornography. Both sessions were well-received, with students participating in the discussions. The interactive activities and anonymous Q&A ensured a comfortable environment for learning as well-

learning as well. During Mental Health Week, the school counselors organized activities for Grades VI and VII to help students learn about mental health. The students made colorful posters that shared important messages about understanding emotions, the value of support from friends and family, and ways to take care

of themselves. They also created ribbons to symbolize different mental health issues, promoting a sense of unity. These fun activities helped students understand mental health better and encouraged them to support one another, making the school a more caring and welcoming place. 

the rest was all silent.



#### WHEN SCIENCE PAINTS THE SKY

Have you ever looked at a bright rainbow after the rain or watched the sky turn orange during sunset and felt amazed? Nature is full of such magical sights that make us stop and stare. But have you ever wondered how these things actually happen? There is a real science behind all this beauty! In this article, let's explore the secrets behind rainbows and some other natural wonders that make our world so colourful and exciting.

#### **How Are Rainbows Formed?**

A rainbow appears when sunlight shines through tiny raindrops in the air. Each raindrop acts like a small glass prism that bends and splits the light into seven beautiful colours — red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet. This bending of light is called refraction, and when the light bounces back inside the raindrop, it is called reflection. When millions of raindrops do this together, we see a bright, colourful arc in the sky.

#### Fun Fact:

No two people see exactly the same rainbow! It depends on where you are standing and the angle of the sunlight.

Sometimes, if we are lucky, we can even see a double rainbow! This happens when the light reflects twice inside the water droplet. The second one looks fainter and its colours are reversed.

#### THE COLOURS OF THE SUNSET

Have you noticed how the sky turns orange, pink or purple when the sun sets? This beautiful scene is caused by something called scattering. During sunset, sunlight has to travel through more air and dust. The shorter light waves like blue and violet get scattered away, while the longer ones like red and orange reach our eyes. That's why the sky looks reddish and golden during sunset.

#### Did You Know?

Sunsets look even more colourful after it rains, because the air becomes cleaner and reflects light better!

#### THE MAGIC OF SNOWFLAKES

Snowflakes may all look alike, but each one is completely

unique. They form high up in the clouds when water vapour freezes into tiny ice crystals. As they fall, the shape of each snowflake changes depending on the temperature and humidity. That's why no two snowflakes are ever the same! Most of them have six sides and look like tiny pieces of art made by nature.

#### Fun Fact:

The largest snowflake ever recorded was about 15 inches wide — that's bigger than a dinner plate!

#### THE NORTHERN LIGHTS

One of the most amazing sights in the world is the Northern Lights, also called the Aurora Borealis. These glowing green and pink lights appear in the sky near the North Pole.

They happen when particles from the sun hit Earth's atmosphere and make gases glow in bright colours. The same thing happens near the South Pole too, where it's called the Aurora Australis or Southern Lights.

### **Overexposure To Crisis**

Every headline seems to be a bearer of catastrophe—a war in one corner of the world, a natural calamity in another. Overconsumption of such media inconspicuously desensitizes the idea of tragedy in our minds, silently choking compassion.

Psychic numbing refers to a tendency for individuals to divert attention from large-scale and past traumatic threats, especially when they involve mass numbers. "If I look at the mass, I will never act. If I look at the one, I will," as said by Mother Teresa, and anchors the 'one versus many' paradox. Paul Slovic, a psychologist, framed how one sympathizes with an identifiable individual in danger, as compared to a million unnamed ones. For instance, many empathize deeply with individual stories of children affected by the conflict in Ukraine or civilians in Gaza, but awareness of the millions suffering globally often fails to provoke the same emotional response.

There are largely two justifications for psychic numbing. The first justification pertains to capacity. Some suggest that humans have limited emotional bandwidth; hence, our brain strongly reacts to a single victim but erodes as the number increases. The second being motivated down-regulation—a defense mechanism that suppresses emotions when empathy feels overwhelming. Scientific evidence suggests groups like medical personnel, who routinely face suffering, show low activation in rACC (rostral anterior cingulate cortex—facilitating emotional processing in the brain) compared to other subjects when exposed to aversive stimuli, indicating a dampened empathetic response. Psychic numbing is not a moral failure; it is an innate psychological response—a natural defense that makes compassion less stifling. By recognizing and understanding it, we can consciously make efforts to reconnect with individual stories of victims and take deliberate action to demonstrate humanity and prove that even amidst global turmoil, compassion stands rooted with resilience and unity.

### ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

**Follow Through for the Low Chip Shot** 

Last month, we discussed the set up for the low chip shot - a most commonly used shot for all juniors. This month, lets have a look at how this shot is to be played

Once you have taken the set up with the ball slightly behind the center of your feet and your weight on to your left leg, you have created some shaft lean. The chipping action requires you to use your arms and shoulders going back and through the stroke with minimal use of the wrist. This will help in making sure that the loft delivered to the ball at impact is less which is the key to the ball taking off low. Try and make sure that you do not use your



wrist through the chipping action as this can also cause you to mishit the ball.

As shown in the picture, you can see how I am maintaining the triangle of my arms as the club goes back and through. My wrists are passive and maintain the loft that I started with in the first place. Thinking of this as an extended putting action is a good way to go
